Boy Scouts Implement Drainage Project

With the help of two groups of Boy Scouts and their parents, the project that brought new roofs and gutters to Kentucky Camp's historic buildings has been completed. Using funds from the American Reinvestment and Recovery Act (the so-called "stimulus money"), the Coronado National Forest contracted to have the 20-year-old wood roofs replaced with new fire-resistant shingles. But with the soil at Kentucky Camp prone to erosion gullies, we needed to make sure that the runoff would be directed away from the building foundations and pathways.

In early 2011, a group of Boy Scouts and their parents helped the Friends begin the drainage project. Under the leadership of Eagle Scout candidate Alex Clabourne, the group dug a trench around the northeast corner and north end of the Headquarters Building. Drainage pipe was laid into the trench on a bed of sand, and connected to three downspouts from the ends of the new, historic-look half-round gutters. Then the trench was filled. At the same time,

other scouts and parents set some masonry blocks upright in the slope in front of the building, to help reduce erosion gullying that has been slowly cutting into that area.

During the trenching process, the wooden front steps to the Headquarters Building were

removed – and substantial rotting was discovered on the wood that was on or near the ground. As a result, there are now new steps – of pressure-treated wood, to last longer – leading into the building.

Some creative drainage pipe routing was required in order to dodge some buried historic plumbing.

A second Eagle Scout project helped complete the overall roof drainage project. A team of Scouts led by Evan Cipra installed pipe to take the runoff from the southeast and southwest corner downspouts away from the building.

Also, during this phase of the project, downspout drainage pipes were laid for the Gold Processing Building and Cabin A.



Thanks to all the Boy Scouts and their parents whose service projects have done so much to help preserve Kentucky Camp, and make the visitor experience more enjoyable. C'mon out and see all the improvements soon!

Plans are well underway for a week-long gathering at Kentucky Camp to tackle some of the bigger projects that are too big for the monthly volunteer days. (Technically, this will not be a "Passport in Time" event since those are Forest Service sponsored events)

This year's event will be the last full week in April: the week of 4/23 through 4/27. Accommodations are tent camping with access to our "five star" solar shower facilities or bring your RV. We anticipate putting together a group meal plan or you can plan your own. We are still looking for a few more folks to round-out a team of 12. Here are the projects we are planning:

- We'll remove the existing manta (cloth) ceiling in Cabin C and install a new drywall ceiling. We'll also reinstall the exposed electrical conduit into the adobe walls.
- Interior plastering in the small room in the Gold Processing Building.
- We'll scan Forest Service slides into our digital photo archive. We will also scan hard copy photos that anyone else would like to contribute.
- Apply sacrificial adobe coat to Gold Processing Building and Cabin C.
- Refurbish Cabin C patio sink rebuild adobe wall underneath and replace the "countertop"


