## Upcoming November Project Week

We are seeking volunteers for a week-long gathering at Kentucky Camp to tackle some of the projects that are too big for our regular monthly volunteer days. This event will be November 11-16. (Monday –Friday)

Accommodations are tent camping with access to our "five star" solar shower facilities or bring your camper or RV. Campers can arrive the weekend before to set-up camp.

Here are the projects we are planning:

- Remove tools and supplies from the "Tool Crib" (the kitchen & pantry of the Headquarters Building); Sort these for retention or disposal, and move whatever we keep into the recently refloored room of the Gold Processing Building.
- Repair and replace the wood floor in the Headquarters kitchen and pantry.
- Replace plywood window covers in the Headquarters kitchen with windows.
- Repair adobe basal coving and surface erosion of all exterior walls (Gold Processing Building, Headquarters Building, Cabin A, etc.)
- Remove materials stored in Cabin A; sort for retention or disposal; construct stable storage racks for historic materials that we keep.
- Run underground electrical service from the power pole to the "new" Tool Crib in the Gold Processing Building.
- Annual Fall maintenance of historic Iris bed

We will once again be joined by a dozen-or-so Verde Valley School students and staff. The school's guiding principles are Academic Excellence; Value of World Citizenship; Service to Others; Value of Physical Labor; and Environmental Stewardship – their contributions at Kentucky Camp have been very welcome! # Hydraulic Nozzle Gets Preservative Coat

The historic hydraulic water nozzle that we put on display in 2012 has received a protective coating thanks to a recommendation by professional metal conservator Ron Harvey.

Last December, we provided a Kentucky Camp tour to Arizona State Historic Preservation Officer (SHPO), Kathryn Leonard and staff archaeologist/Forest Service liaison, Jim Cogswell. Jim noted that the iron hydraulic water nozzle has a fair amount of corrosion and suggested there may be preservation measures to prolong its.

Jim got us in contact with Ron Harvey who recommended a couple of light coats of Penetrol to help slow the corrosion process. We applied this coating at the April 2018 volunteer day.

### Betty Leavengood

Author and Kentucky Camp volunteer Betty Leavengood passed away at her home in Davidson, NC on May 23, 2018.

Betty was an active Kentucky Camp volunteer and board member during the 1990 – 2000's before she moved out of Arizona.

She was an avid hiker and led many hikes in the Kentucky Camp area including the waterline hike.... The portion of the Arizona Trail that follows the route that water was piped to the Kentucky Camp area for the purpose of mining gold.

She wrote numerous books about Arizona. She wrote "Grand Canyon Women: Lives Shaped by Landscape." She is probably best known for the "Tucson Hiking Guide" that has become a trail bible for Southern Arizona hikers.

She also wrote a booklet about Kentucky Camp that is still in print and continues to be used for fund raising today.

During her years in Tucson, she was a schoolteacher and worked at a hospital for a volunteer coordinator.




